

You Don't Know What You've Got

In 1970 singer song writer Joni Mitchell released the song <u>"Big Yellow Taxi"</u> with the line "Don't it always seem to go that you don't know what you've got 'til it's gone."

Currently people throughout the world are realising the truth of those words. As the bubble many of us live in shrinks ever smaller and all those important materialistic truths we held dear now seem hollow and misleading, we are faced with the simplicity of our existence. Those missing truths, physical human contact, giving someone struggling a hug, a hug of welcome, standing or sitting in a group chatting, visiting friends and family, working, playing, closely watching sports and events together. That has gone at present. We are designed for such things; it is our success as a species. The question is, "What happens when we come out of this crisis?" Recently someone told me within two weeks everything would revert to how it was pre lockdown. I could see their point. But has the virus been a tipping point in this world? Has it shone a light on the way we exist and our priorities? Will it be the catalyst of change to take humanity to a better place? Will you revert to pre lockdown thinking and actions? Will the nations revert to the pre-Corona 19 world and all of us then sit patiently waiting for the next catastrophe?" For certain, as Christians, this is a tipping point for reaching out to the community around us that is searching to fill a vacuum of the lost "truth" of materialism and celebrity culture. That vacuum can be filled with the truth in Jesus' love for us all.

Encourage people to watch the online services which break down the perceptions of church life. Perceptions are people's reality - those barriers to faith must be broken down. Watching and listening to an online service in the safety of your home could be the first step to faith and a new life for many. Send the link for the services by email or text, phone people and talk about them, as we have seen by the Corona 19 things can spread very quickly given the right conditions. Joni Mitchell's words "Don't it always seem to go that you don't know what you've got 'til it's gone," are powerful. What is gone is the glue holding us socially and physically together that we have taken for granted for so long. As a church the spirituality of the love of Jesus is thriving in a new way and is ready to be shared.
