

Prayers Skyrocketing

Many - if not - all - are saddened by the present circumstances. No one knows how long this strange season of uncertainty and despair will last. We, however, need constant reminders that God is still at work even in this time of distress. Writes Assistant Pastor Jerry Otieno. Ultimately, God is in control and we can trust Him to work all things together for good in the lives of those who love Him (<u>Rom 8:28</u>).

In past few weeks, I've been encouraged by the knowledge that God is actively stirring hearts and reminding people of who He is throughout this time of crisis. I recently came across a report by a Danish economist who found that in March 2020, Google searches for "Prayer" skyrocketed hitting the highest levels that they have in the past five years. She argued that the increased searches for prayer likely indicates an increased number of people actually praying and can be accounted for by the move from prayer in public to prayer in private .

Similarly, last Sunday the Guardian reported the results of a survey that revealed that the British public are increasingly turning to prayer and many more are tuning into online services. According to a new survey, a quarter of adults in the UK have watched or listened to a religious service since the coronavirus lockdown began, and one in 20 have started praying during the crisis. The findings of the poll reinforce indications of an increase in the numbers of people turning to faith for succour amid uncertainty and despair. It also found that a third of young adults aged between 18 and 34 had watched or listened to an online or broadcast religious service, compared with one in five adults over the age of 55. Furthermore, one in five of those who have tuned into services in the past few weeks say they have never gone to church.

Let us be reminded that God is at work in and through this pandemic. The church doors may be shut, but we rejoice in the fact that the gospel is not chained, and that God's word is still spreading. Let us therefore, continue praying for positive responses from people in our community who have been attending our church online. Let us trust God that many will be prompted by the Holy Spirit to start attending services at the chapel when all this is over. As we pray, the Lord help us to prepare our hearts to receive broken, grieving people. Finally, let us conduct ourselves in the world, with integrity and godly sincerity and do so, relying not on worldly wisdom but on God's grace. (2 Cor 1:12).
