Our church is situated on the north west of Southend-on-Sea; we are blessed with the seaside and countryside on our doorstep.

We are currently looking for a new minister to join our MIT, Jo Hellenbrand, who looks after our older people in the church. Like many churches the pandemic has made us draw on our strengths as a fellowship to care for each other to make sure everyone is supported, physically, mentally and spiritually.

Our knowledge of technology has increased with on-line services and Zoom Prayer Meetings and we also included an 'after Sunday morning service Coffee time via Zoom' along with Talking Jesus, Prayer One and Prayer Two courses. Along with another local church, we delivered 155 gift bags to care home residents and staff at our three local homes in Eastwood at Christmas and Easter. Many helped in this outreach which was very well received.

In January 2021 we opened up our church as a Food Bank Distribution Centre linked with The Trussell Trust and again we have received much support and are finding it wonderful to be able to help those in need at this time.

Our prayer requests:

For us to continue to find ways to reach out to our community.

To establish our Youth work again after the pandemic. Seek our Lord Jesus Christ in finding a new minister for our church.

Kusum's in-laws blamed her for her husband's death. But God stepped in.

When Kusum's husband and son died, her in-laws said her faith was the reason. But God has worked miracles in the lives of her family and community – and used your prayers and support to sustain Kusum.

When Open Doors local partners in India first visited Kusum*, she was facing terrible persecution from her own family. She had already suffered deeply – losing both her husband and her son to illness. What made it even worse was that her community blamed Kusum for these two tragedies.

"The villagers didn't allow me to bury my son," she remembers. "They said, 'You brought this curse upon your family! Because of your faith, your husband and your son are dead!' In the end, I was allowed to bury my son on the outskirts of the village. I was all by myself. Nobody was allowed to help me."

You might expect Kusum to get support from her in -laws, but the opposite was the case. Her father-in-law threatened to kill her.

"It's your fault my son is dead!" Kusum remembers him yelling outside her house, swinging an axe. "It's your fault my grandson is dead! You killed them with your toxic faith! Come outside! I will cut you to pieces!"

Kusum kept praying – and her prayers were answered

Throughout it all, Kusum was determined to cling to her faith. She prayed fervently to God. "I had only one certainty: I would not betray Jesus. Despite all of my tragedies, He has never disappointed me."

And God is answering Kusum's prayers in ways she hadn't ever expected. As well as receiving financial and spiritual support from local Open Doors partners, thanks to your help, Kusum has seen an enormous shift in the attitude of her village.

"Due to my Christian faith, I faced a lot of persecution from my in-laws and the villagers," Kusum says, "but now many villagers are coming to Jesus in my village. Since the pandemic lockdown, ten new families have come to Christ!"

Kusum's family are coming to Christ

Most of the new Christians in Kusum's community came to faith after they were healed through prayer. Several times a week, she joins with the other believers in her village to pray. "When we gather for prayer, we pray for all Christians who are facing persecution. At the same time, I explain to all those believers that no matter how much persecution comes, we have to remain in the Word of God. We must be ready to face persecution."Kusum is especially thrilled that members of her own family have come to know Jesus! "My in-laws used to persecute me a lot, but now they believe in Christ," she shares. "Many times, they used to come to my house to kill me. I always used to pray for them. The Lord heard my prayer, and now they are believers.

"Everyone has come to faith except my father-in-law – although he is also learning about the Christian faith. He now asks me to pray for him."

Life under lockdown

Like most of us, life became difficult for Kusum during lockdown – but she has not felt abandoned, thanks to you. "My financial condition was not good... but even at that time, God helped my family and fulfilled all my needs. My father and my brother used to bring everything I needed. I also got relief from Open Doors local partners. They helped me start a grocery store for my livelihood, and they always ask about my wellbeing and help me."

As the pandemic continues to worsen in India, please pray for protection for Kusum and those she knows.

Kusum has seen enormous change in her family and neighbourhood, but persecution is not over. She asks for prayer, as threats and discrimination continue around her. "Persecution is still going on in nearby villages," she shares. "We get drinking water from the village hand pump. Right now, we get rations in the ration card, but some people in the village are saying that they will stop our ration card and will not even provide water. The number of believers is growing in my village, so the people of the nearby villages are inciting the people of our village against us."

Cromer Food Bank Update

It is more than a year now since we entered the world of lockdown and restrictions and during that time we have seen many changes at the Foodbank, some will be temporary whilst others will be lasting. We have provided uninterrupted service for Foodbank clients during this time, through the commitment, enthusiasm and perseverance of our volunteer teams across the distribution centres, warehouse, van and office and we are indebted to each and every one of them.

During the last financial year, we have seen the demand for our Foodbank increase significantly. Vouchers fulfilled were up 26%, people fed up by 42% and the number of children fed by 66%.

Despite the fact that we were supporting one particular school through

lockdown, there is a definite trend towards more families. needing us. However, incoming donations were 66375kg, up 50% on the previous year. Once again we have been able to meet increased demand. One final statistic, in the last 5 years the number of vouchers fulfilled has increased by 60%. The goal of reducing the need for Foodbanks does not seem to be attainable at present so we will continue to work with agencies and community



groups to meet the need of people in crisis for the foreseeable future.

Due to the increasing demand on our service, the trustees have decided to appoint an Assistant Project Manager who will assist in the day to day operations and take on, and work with current volunteers, on all aspect of communications. To cope with increased demand, we have decided to put an order in for another van. It will be the same model as Peter Wenham (Chairman of Trustees) our present one, but increased battery capacity will enable us to cover greater distance. We plan to use the van, which we hope will be with us in August, at distribution centres when we eventually return to opening them fully. It is likely that we will continue to offer delivery for clients along with the opportunity to visit the centre to collect and speak to someone about their situation.

For a long time now we have been discussing whether a different name would better reflect who we are and so it has been decided that we will re-brand as North Norfolk Foodbank. We are very aware that we have always been a district wide Foodbank and our boundaries in the last year have stretched even further, so it seems a logical step for our name to reflect this. We will be in touch with you about this in due course.

We had a very successful Christmas hamper delivery programme and we are now planning to offer schools support with their breakfast clubs, which will enable the neediest children in each school to receive a meal at the start of the day. We will also



continue to support the community

larders and fridges that are spread across our district. In addition, we have decided to extend our Energybank scheme supporting people with their energy bills through the summer.

However, whatever projects we take on, we will never lose sight of the fact that our main aim is to support people in crisis with food parcels and, if necessary, signpost them on to agencies that can provide

help with the issues that cause the crisis. This we will continue to do with your support, for which we are incredibly arateful.
