EBA Prayer Focus 30th May 2021

Kings Lynn Baptist Church

This week our attention turns to the Norfolk market town of King's Lynn, home to Cornerstone King's Lynn Baptist Church.

Cornerstone sits in the heart of South Lynn, a centre of regeneration over the past 15 years, where it is the sole church among many new homes and businesses. These developments have opened the door to new opportunities to reach people with the gospel, and the church has played a key role in bringing the old community together with the new.

The Church has had a growing vision to be a safe meeting place for the local community, and in 2019 they opened a community café following some major renovation work on the existing church building.

This has enabled a greater outward focus of ministry, including the running of a Community Fridge, space for community groups and the provision of a community lunch for those struggling with isolation.

The Church has worked closely with Churches Together in King's Lynn to establish a Night shelter, a CAP Debt Centre and to support the local Foodbank.

The pandemic caused the inevitable challenges, but the opportunity was also taken to support local families with food parcels, collecting prescriptions and keeping connected with those facing isolation etc. Free children's meals were provided when the Café was permitted to open. Services resumed on Easter Sunday alongside a live stream.

There are big adjustments for the Church in the coming months. After 14 years, Pastor Kevan Crane will be stepping down at the end of July. There is a sense that God is leading the Church into a new season as they await God's guidance.

Prayer Points:

- For God's leading as restrictions are lifted. Wisdom to know what to leave behind and what to take up.
- For the Leadership team as they enter a pastoral vacancy and the Church as they look to the future.
- For the opening of the Community Café as restrictions are lifted and for the ministry through the Café.
- For a fresh outpouring of The Holy Spirit and for a fruitful season moving forward.
- For the Children's and youth work as they are able to safely meet back at Church.

Quotes of the Week

"To put it simply: the Holy Spirit bothers us. Because he moves us, he makes us walk, he pushes the Church to go forward. And we are like Peter at the Transfiguration: 'Ah, how wonderful it is to be here like this, all together!' ... But don't bother us. "The point is that there is a very old idea that the Holy Spirit is functioning in our lives not only to give us power as Christians but also to clean up our lives, lead us toward holiness. I will have to admit that certain kinds of holy Christians have always repelled me. I have never been able to tell whether it is because they make me uncomfortable, knowing that I am far from holy, or whether they are in fact making a serious error in supposing themselves to be holy when in fact all they are is sanctimonious. I will have to admit also, however, that I have met a few Christians who make no show of holiness yet whom I sense to be living on a different plane from my own. These people have a quality that strikes me as being at the heart of real holiness; they do not make me aware of their goodness so much as of their hope. They do not point up my shortcomings in contrast to their saintliness; they point up my potential.

I think Christ must have had this kind of holiness. He would never have attracted men like rough Peter and worldly Matthew otherwise. The secret ingredient in this kind of transforming holiness, I came to think, was love. When I came into contact with love as an overwhelming experience in the baptism of the Holy Spirit, I found that I had been cleaned, built up, healed. I knew a kind of wholeness I'd never dreamed of; and the words whole, holy, and health are all derivatives of the same Anglo-Saxon word haml, meaning "complete." This is the type of sanctification that comes from contact with the Christ-love of the Holy Spirit."

Has lockdown changed the way we serve?

As things open up and “ease down” begins, make a decision to step out, to choose to love and care for those others don’t see, writes Hugh McNeill

As things open up, we can’t forget what we have learnt through the pandemic.

The easing of lockdown restrictions could not have come sooner for many. The town centre in Coventry – where I live – was bustling with people yesterday, visiting shops, enjoying a meal indoors and hugging family for the first time in 2021! Yet, with our excitement to get back to normal – will we forget many things lockdown has taught us?

Since the pandemic hit the UK in March 2020 the community spirit in our towns, cities and villages was so present – did you feel that where you live? While people grabbed hold of their daily dose of exercise, suddenly eyes were opened to the needs of the community and complete strangers found themselves stopping on a walk to talk to one another.

There were small acts of kindness everywhere: notes written to neighbours offering help; newspapers and groceries delivered to those who were shielding; prescriptions picked up; training relatives on iPads on the doorsteps; rainbows put up in windows to honour the NHS and cheer up children; and many neighbours stood in solidarity out of their doorways as we clapped for the NHS each Thursday. At the Foodbank we saw a 20 per cent increase in the number of people attending foodbank in the past year, with hundreds of new volunteers stepping up to help this need.

We were a community of servants. A nation serving our communities. Surely, we don’t want to lose our togetherness now the world is opening up step by step? Serving others is core to who we are as Christians, and we should serve from a heart that earnestly seeks to love others as Christ loves us – but is it that easy?

Philippians 2:1-8 (NIV) says:

Therefore, if you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any common sharing in the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, 2 then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and of one mind. 3 Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, 4 not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others. 5 In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus

There are so many passages in the Bible that speak about serving others, this is just one. Yet, for me, it encapsulates the heart of the servant I want to be. When we recognise that we serve a loving Saviour, then our attitude and how we serve others needs to be in alignment with his. Now, don’t get me wrong I have not always got this right. I, like many, am looking forward to being able to hug friends and family again, to shop with ease, to go to the pub, yet if I put myself first and the welfare and needs of others second, I am not living the truth of that passage, nor am I living out the community I want to see around me.

We have a challenge before us all; are we going to be the communities we long to see? According to a report released earlier this year, over the course of lockdown, 71 per cent of churches have delivered new services, many in areas of the community they have never been active in before, and 5 million meals have been provided to those in need by the church every month since the beginning of the pandemic. Many with dwindling congregations have seen their numbers swell, churches have pulled together to provide for the needs of their communities and have done an amazing job of responding to the crisis.

If Christ is our example, we need to continue to show his compassion, tenderness, care and servant heart in our neighbourhoods?

At Coventry Foodbank, on a daily basis I meet single mums trying to hold a family together; single men with no family or friends to reach out to; those struggling to come to terms with a bereavement or loss of employment; those waiting for a benefit payment still four weeks away; broken relationships; mental health issues; physical ailments. And all of them carry hurt and pain and shame.

The need is still out there.

Serving our communities will take a challenge, it’s not going to be the ‘the new normal’. It’s down to us to decide to change, to step out and find the need that still remains. The action of serving, the decision to act in humility to treat others with a care and compassion most certainly is at the heart of a servant.

World Hunger Day this year, Friday 28 May, is focussing on the holistic care needed to end food hunger, and focussing solutions on community-led projects. Ending poverty is possible when people have the necessary tools and resources and when solutions are community-led — by and for the people living in conditions of chronic hunger.


God looks to us. This need is our responsibility, and it doesn’t have to be hard. Seeing volunteers at the foodbank just taking the time to listen to some – without patronising or judging their situation is so rare for many of those who come in. Foodbanks, soup kitchens, and night shelters could all use more volunteers, not just for practical help but to talk to people, to hear them, to be a friend.

Serving others has become one of the greatest privileges of my life. The people in my communities cannot just matter to God, they have to matter to me too. So, as things open up and “easedown” begins, make a decision to step out, to choose to love and care for those others don’t see.

The Leprosy Mission

Caring for those caught up in one of the world's worst humanitarian crises

The Leprosy Mission is caring for those caught up in one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.

National Director Peter Waddup says his colleagues in Mozambique are risking their lives each day to care for the country's most vulnerable as the insurgency intensifies.

Since 2017 the people of Cabo Delgado, Mozambique's most northerly province, have faced escalating violence from men with guns and machetes attacking communities.

More than 2,000 civilians have been killed and homes destroyed. The UN is reporting that more than 530,000 people have fled Cabo Delgado – a quarter of its population - as a result of the violence.

The recent hardship is compounded by climate change, hunger, homelessness, leprosy and, now, the widespread South African coronavirus variant.

Peter said: "We are in touch with our colleagues in Cabo Delgado daily and the situation is desperate.

I had the privilege of visiting our projects in Cabo Delgado three years ago. Hearing the current horrifying situation truly breaks my heart.

Our thoughts and prayers are with Leprosy Mission staff risking their lives each day to help those affected by leprosy. These are people who are all too often disabled as a result of not being cured of leprosy fast enough.

Mozambique is ranked among the world's poorest countries with two

thirds of the population living under the poverty line of US\$1.90 a day. People affected by leprosy are always among the poorest and are often shunned by society because of prejudice surrounding the disease.

Tragically it is typically people affected by leprosy that cannot flee a village under attack. This is either because they don't have the financial means or because their disabilities prevent them from escaping.

"It is utterly heart-breaking.

Our colleagues are working with churches in Cabo Delgado to support those left homeless and traumatised by the violence."

The people of Cabo Delgado mainly survive through subsistence farming. It is currently what is known as the 'hungry' season ahead of the harvest in Mozambique.

Many farmers are still recovering from the devastation and flooding caused by Cyclone Kenneth and Cyclone Idai in 2019," Peter said.

Churches and individuals across the UK are supporting the [Unconditional Appeal](#), which will help build Community Hubs, or Hubs of Hope, from which to lead the fight against leprosy and provide a beating heart to communities.

Farmers are learning how to protect their crops from extreme weather at the Community Hubs as well as sell surplus produce to provide an income.

Peter said: "There has never been a more pressing need to welcome everyone in the community to a Hub of Hope. Together they can work together to create healthier and more prosperous communities..
