EBA Prayer Focus 11th July 2021

Lighthouse Community Church

Sheringham is a seaside resort on the north Norfolk coast where you will find the Lighthouse Community Church located in modern, purpose-built premises in the town. The ministry team in this very active church is led by Revd Ian Savory. The church has strong youth and children's work and the building is a busy community hub. During lockdown there have been no Sunday services at the church but livestreaming has seen a growing number of followers including brand new

people joining in. In person gatherings will start again once restrictions are lifted but livestreaming will continue. There are three midweek devotional items produced which have over 200 views on Facebook for each time. A dedicated team of people help with everything going on, including the distribution of food parcels and fresh food, and packed lunches for vulnerable children.

The church is very engaged with the community in other ways. It supports Sam and Suzy Abramian who are working as mission listeners with Good Hope Communities in north Norfolk. One of the community projects is Hope in Action who have bought a house in Sheringham and have a family moving in September out of bedsit temporary accommodation. The church has bought the old St John's Ambulance Hall in the town and turned it into a community outreach project as a 'men's shed' and an adjacent area called 'The Patch' -- a large area to grow plants and produce.

Please pray:

- For the church to do what God wants and not what we want to do
- That the church will fulfil its mission to be a Hub church that blesses Norfolk and beyond
- For the family moving into the new Hope in Action house
- That the church will be led by the holy spirit to do what is right

Open Doors

Join the Indian church in July's month of prayer – week 2

Christians in India are urgently asking for our prayers as they find themselves caught between two crises: pandemic and persecution. So we have set aside July to pray with them. There is much to pray into, but also much to be grateful for. Thank you – your prayers make such a difference and mean so much to your persecuted family. This is the second week of prayer points. All names have been changed for security reasons.

Thursday 8 July

In 2014, a leader of a large Hindu extremist group said that there will be no Christians left in India by 2021. Despite a rise in persecution in recent years, believers continue to courageously follow Jesus.

Ravi was killed because he refused to stop telling others about Jesus. "If needed I will die for Jesus, but I will never leave Him," shares his wife, Sumi. "I will continue living here, and will continue the ministry of my husband."

Praise God for the witness of believers like Ravi and Sumi, and ask the Lord to thwart the plans of extremists.

Friday 9 July

[Vinita and her husband](#) have faced constant harassment from their community since becoming Christians.

One day, Vinita was praying with her pastor's family when Hindu extremists barged in. Vinita and the other believers were all seriously injured and were refused treatment at hospital by staff under pressure from the extremists. Thanks to you, they received treatment at a private hospital and are getting support as they file a case against their attackers.

Pray that the perpetrators will be brought to justice, and that Vinita, her pastor and their families will find strength in God's comfort.

Saturday 10 July

After refusing to stop sharing the gospel with others, despite threats, Gaurav was falsely accused of using fraudulent means to convert people to Christianity. He and two of his friends were imprisoned for four months.

It was a further three years before their innocence was proven, during which time they were ostracised by their community and deemed criminals. Open Doors local partners came alongside them to provide practical and legal aid.

Praise God that they have been cleared of

charges, and pray that God will use our brothers' persevering faith to help others.

Sunday 11 July

When Aditi (16) and her parents became Christians, their community mocked and rejected them, whilst relatives withdrew financial support. Aditi was about to abandon her studies when you stepped in to pay her school fees.

Despite ongoing challenges, the family trusts in God. "It's true that we need courage to trust in God. And that courage comes through prayer," Aditi's father shares.

Ask the Lord to build up Aditi through her studies, and pray that her relatives will receive Jesus as Lord.

Monday 12 July

Since starting a church a few years ago, which around 200 people now attend, Suraj has been closely watched by Hindu extremists. They are angry that people have left their traditional faith to go to his church. The hostility came to a head when they beat him for three hours, threatening further consequences unless he shuts the church.

Pray for protection of Suraj and his family, and that God will use the witness of the church to draw the extremists to the love of Jesus.

Tuesday 13 July

Praveen and his wife Shanti became Christians after God healed Shanti when a local pastor prayed for her. But their new faith led to hostility from the wider family, who refused to give Praveen land that he had inherited. The couple set up their own shop, but it didn't make a profit – and then the pandemic hit. Today the shop is running well after you provided goods to fill their shelves. "I am so grateful for the kind help," Shanti shares.

Wednesday 14 July

In the run up to local elections, Hindu extremists burned down the hut where a church led by Pastor Sameer gathered, accusing the Christians of embracing a 'foreign' religion and persuading people to vote against their Hindu political party.

With your help, the church has built a new place to meet. "It greatly encouraged our faith to know that there are others standing with us," Pastor Sameer shares. "Since the church hall is bigger, even more people come to our church."

Give thanks to God that He has made the church fruitful in the land of their suffering (Genesis 41:52).

People who are grieving need the Holy Spirit, not Spiritualism

People whose loved ones died during the pandemic are often suffering complicated, unresolved grief - but turning to Spiritualism isn't the answer. By Louise Morse

I'm very sad to read [the warning by the Baptist Deliverance Study Group](#) that people grieving the death of their loved ones during the pandemic are turning to spiritualism. It's been my experience that it is mainly older people who go to spiritualist churches, and there could be a link in the fact that 82 is the average age of people who died during Covid. Many have lost life-long spouses and relatives.

My parents were spiritualists and we children were sent every Sunday to the Spiritualist Sunday School. I am not surprised to read that the Deliverance Study Group have had people asking for deliverance 'from some horrific consequences of becoming involved in spiritualism.' They have no idea that they are dealing with demons. Most spiritualists are simply misguided individuals struggling to cope with unresolved grief, believing that they can once again speak with their loved ones. Jesus Christ is not presented as the Saviour, but as a perfect medium to 'the other side'. Darwin has a lot to answer for as many spiritualists believe that death is simply going to another place that is a part of the evolutionary process.

People whose loved ones died during the pandemic are often suffering complicated grief. They weren't able to say goodbye to their loved ones, which is the first step in a healing, grieving process. Now many are coping with anger, guilt and deep regret, and many PTSD.

Two years ago my 19 year old grandson was killed in a motorbike accident on a deserted country road, eight weeks after my youngest son, living with his family in South Carolina, lost his battle with Leukaemia. I couldn't get a flight in time to South Carolina, although his wife helped us speak over a phone speaker. In the following months I came to realise the importance of that final, 'goodbye, see you in the morning'.

When the pandemic struck, and the deaths began my prayers were for the families left behind. Self-isolation meant that the usual social support wasn't in place and they were thrown onto their own resources.

Throughout my grieving I'd been supported by my Christian friends,



my church, my colleagues and my family. I found the reality of the Scriptures that say, 'underneath are the everlasting arms,' and that the Holy Spirit is our comforter. And as a cognitive behavioural therapist I was aware of practical things we can do that help on this grief journey.

The Bible tells us to 'comfort others with the comfort that we ourselves were comforted' (2 Corinthians 1:4). So, after speaking with other Christians about how they were helped, to widen it from just my own experience, I wrote a booklet, 'Coping with Grief and Loss'. Many people have emailed to say how helpful they found it.

Recently I gave a copy to an 84-year-old whose 51 year old son had just died suddenly from a heart attack. She said, 'it could have been written exactly for me.'

If you know people who are struggling with unresolved grief, could I suggest that you give them a copy? We know that faith leaders have bought a supply so they can do this.
