EBA Prayer Focus 26th September 2021 Halstead Baptist Church

The town of Halstead is located in the Braintree District of Essex. Due to new housing developments, the town is growing and expanding rapidly and this presents new opportunities for the fellowship at Halstead Baptist Church. The minister at Halstead Baptist Church, Revd Sean Carter, arrived in 2014. He is supported by two Deacons and an assistant. As the church emerges from lockdown, they are praying that God will guide them in the appointment of a Treasurer and further Deacons to support the leadership. Halstead Baptist Church describes itself as "not a large fellowship". It faces many of the similar struggles that all smaller churches face.

A great joy for the fellowship at Halstead was shortly after lockdown ended, the church celebrated a baptism. Two new people have come into membership and the online service has brought a new face into the regular congregation.

In recent years, the church has ventured onto the High Street with the opening of the Rivers of Life shop. With one paid member of staff and a group of enthusiastic volunteers, the shop sells charitable items at low prices! In a very real sense, the Church is where the people are. Having sold a redundant building, prior to lockdown, the fellowship bought a house. Working alongside a local

Christian charity, they are looking to house people in need. As the fellowship seeks to follow in the footsteps of Christ, they are slowly making a difference in the town.

As the church looks to the future, discussions are beginning about forming an LEP with the local United Reformed Church. This could present some exciting opportunities.

Table Tennis is Back

Wednesday saw the restart of the over 60s Table Tennis in the schoolroom.

The Over 60's Table Tennis, which started on 17th September 2008 after a request by non- members of the Church as an experiment, has now become very much part of our recognised Church activities. Although our title provides a minimum age limit, we do have a good proportion of



players actually over 80. The approach was that this would be a 'Blue Moon' event, open to all, encouraging non-Church members to attend the Church and to join in. As before the lockdowns they met normally on a Wednesday morning each week in the School Room, starting at 09.30 hours and finishing at 12.00 hours. Coffee and tea are provided and the break for these allows them time for socialising.

The Feast of the Tabernacles

This feast comes on the 15th of Tishri according to the bible calendar and usually coincides with the end of Sept or early Oct (22nd Sept on our calendar) and lasts 7 days (Levit 23v33-44). Writes Janet Nicholson.

The feast is primarily agricultural in its character and is a joyous occasion for all the family with praise and thanksgiving for God's bounties as the harvest has been brought in from the fields, the groves and the orchards.

The Feast of Tabernacles also commemorates God's mighty deliverance of His people from Egypt and their 40 years of wilderness wandering dwelling in tents and tabernacles. Jews observe Sukkot, or the Feast of Booths, by building little tabernacles or booths with walls of plaited branches and thatched roofs which give shade by day but permit the stars to gaze down upon them by night, faithfully fulfilling the ancient command "Ye shall dwell in booths for 7 days." The Sukkah is meant not only to hold one family but to host guests and all who wish to join in the celebration. Its about sharing what is yours with others.

The Feast of Tabernacles, like other feasts of Israel focuses the attention of God's people, both on the past, on what God has done, and in the future, on what God will do. The prophetic message of the feast is that there is shelter in the Tabernacle of God under the wings of the Shekinah glory for the Jew first and also the Gentile nations. Writes Janet Nicholson.

Two outstanding features of the feast were the pouring of water in the Temple lasting 6 days and the brilliant illumination of the Temple. The pouring of water was a visual interpretation of God's grace in sending rain and also prophetic and Messianic in its hope, looking towards the outpouring of the Holy Spirit not only upon Israel but also the believers of all the nations under the reign of Messiah King. On the last day of the feast, the Lord Jesus stood in the Temple crying "If any man thirst, let him come into me and drink. He that believes in me, the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water." (John7v38). Jesus was implying that He was the answer to their prayers.

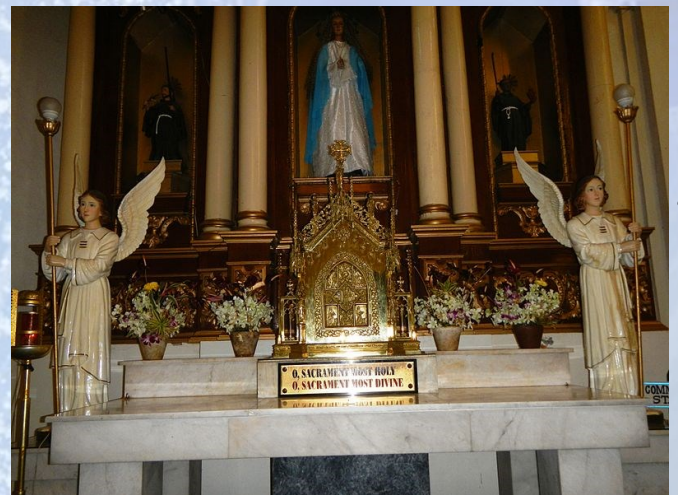
The second central feature of the feast was the illumination of the Temple in Jerusalem. Pilgrims came to the Temple with lights and torches, while in the Temple itself the golden candlesticks were lighted, this illuminated most of Jerusalem and surroundings. Amidst all this Jesus stood and proclaimed am the light of the world." Thus the 3 aspects of the feast which stand out boldly are a harvest of Thanksgiving, a national commemoration of redemption and Faith's leap into the future, when Jehovah shall gather the nations in the Messianic Kingdom of His blessed Son, the Lord Jesus, (Zech14v16,17).

Today, the Feast of Booths, or Tabernacles or Sukkot, is celebrated by a growing number of groups, including Messianic Jews, Church of God groups, and Apollo Quiboloy's Kingdom of Jesus Christ church in the Philippines, as well as the International Christian Embassy Jerusalem (ICEJ).

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Reflecting on the power of prayer

A testimony of answered prayer and the goodness of our God, by Vicki Miller, Scheme Manager at independent housing scheme Royd Court, West Yorkshire.

I knew on first entering Royd Court, run by Christian charity Pilgrims' Friend Society, that it was a place rooted in prayer and full of the Spirit. It was just before Christmas over a decade ago and the residents had gathered in the lounge cheerily singing carols. As we hold our annual [Pilgrims' Friend Society Prayer Week](#) (12-18 September), I think back over my time at Royd Court, particularly the storm of the last year and a half. I am encouraged that we continue to stand firm on a foundation of faithful prayer, but as the Church we need to continue praying for older people and the issues that face them, especially as so many of them are diligent in their prayers for the wider world.

Prayer has been our rock through the pandemic. When Covid struck, Abi, the care manager, and I went for a prayer walk around the building. Bibles in hand we set off. When we got to each of the corners we stopped and prayed. By the time we got to the first corner we were crying so much we had to run back for tissues. It was incredibly emotional, but as we prayed through the tears a verse from Psalm 91:10 came to me, *"no harm will overtake you, no disaster will come near your home"*. We prayed that Covid would not enter our home.

And the Lord has answered our prayers. We have not had a single symptomatic case of coronavirus in Royd Court. Not one. We continue to ask for protection every day but, in the midst of the devastation the virus has caused, we rejoice in the incredible blessing of the Lord's continued protection.

During lockdown we sent prayer letters to each of our residents to highlight specific times and issues we would all pray for. There was a real sense that even though we couldn't be together physically, we were united in community as we prayed.

Since before the first brick was laid, prayer has been a foundation of Royd Court. When Pilgrims' Friend Society first set out to build the Housing Scheme, they struggled to find a suitable location. They finally found a site and, after the rigmarole of negotiations, had an offer accepted. But the team's relief was short lived when only a short while later the offer was retracted. The seller had received a significantly higher offer from a supermarket chain. The management team were devastated and asked for prayer. Together with the volunteers and staff, they prayed and waited. A couple of days passed and they were beginning to consider other options, when they received a phone call from the seller. Since deciding to sell to the supermarket chain, he had been unable to sleep as Royd Court and Pilgrims' Friend Society wouldn't leave his mind. He was ringing to say that he was returning to the lower offer to sell the property to Pilgrims' Friend Society. The power of our prayers to the Lord Jesus — as we seek an almighty and loving God who

can make a way when the situation seems impossible — cannot be underestimated!

But it isn't the building that gives Royd Court its foundation in prayer, it is the people that live here. Whether it is John, one of our residents, getting up at 5am every morning for 365 days of the year to pray through the Psalms. Or the elderly husband and wife who, throughout the pandemic, took lists of the male and female residents respectively and rang each one every single day to pray with them.

The assumption that working with older, frailer people means you have more impact on them as a carer than they have on you, could not be further from the truth. Our residents may sometimes be physically frail, but they are prayer warriors. I often feel they keep our team going, not the other way around. Just the other week, a member of staff had a serious operation. The depth of the residents' prayers was palpable, and the operation was an incredible success — there are so many other examples I could share.

We have recently started gathering together again to pray in limited group gatherings and my, how we have all missed it! The residents come together every morning from Monday to Friday as a community. During one of the first meetings, I was working in the top floor lounge, but ended up not getting much done that half hour! The sound of their singing was absolutely unbelievable. It was so loud, so heartfelt, that I got my phone out to record it. And I was two floors up!

I feel the peace and power of knowing the residents are upholding us and each other in prayer every day and I have so much to learn from them. In the wisdom of their years and the crises they have lived through, they have learnt the importance of having prayer as a foundation of their living and active faith.

I hope this testimony of answered prayer and the goodness of our God will encourage you to join with Pilgrims' Friend Society in praying for older people and the issues facing them in the coming week.
