EBA Prayer Focus 24th April 2022 Maidstone Road Baptist Church

Maidstone Road Baptist Church are welcoming, friendly and generous hearted fellowship in the Walton area of Felixstowe. The town is home to Britain's largest container port, and is currently experiencing the start of an housing expansion, much of it within walking distance of the church.

The church is home to a strong Parish Nursing ministry, run in conjunction with two other neighbouring churches. The ministry has a Parish Nurse, a Parish Mental Health Nurse and a team of enthusiastic volunteers. Apart from individual help for clients with health issues, it has a chair-based exercise class, a "No Labels" group for those with mental health issues, and 'Fizzability' for disabled working age people. Walton is an

area of significant social as well as spiritual need, and since Covid regulations have eased, the church has begun a process of prayer and reflection as to how to address these challenges in new ways.

Additionally, the church's Pastor, Revd Mark Reid retires next year, so the church has begun the process of exploring its next steps. As part of this process the church recently committed to ten days of prayer.

Please pray for the following:

- For the church's existing ministry, especially Parish Nursing and its associated ministries, as well as the many clients that are being helped by the nursing staff and volunteers.
- For the challenge of reaching our new neighbours who will be moving into the new houses soon.
- For a clear vision as to the direction of the church's ministry, particularly as the church looks towards a new pastorate. What sort of church is God calling MRBC to be in the coming years and that it will be led to call a pastor that will fulfil the Lord's purposes for the church in the coming years.

DID YOU KNOW?

"The hymn Amazing Grace is performed around the world over 10 million times annually and appears on over 11,000 albums. It has been the anthem of the American slaves, was on Top of the Pops in 1969/70 when sung by Judy Collins and even popularised the bagpipes when played by the Royal Scots Dragoon Guards." Writes Ron Skivington.

DO YOU KNOW its history?

John Newton, the hymn's writer, lost his mum when he was 7 years old and was taken to sea by his dad at 11 years, pressed into the Royal navy where he received 8 dozen lashes for trying to abscond. Later he sailed on slave ships and was abandoned by one crew off the West Coast of Africa where he became a slave himself until rescued.

In 1748 he was caught in a dreadful storm off Ireland for over a week and it was when lashed to the wheel, trying to hold a steady course, Newton began to recall scripture verses his mum had taught him, that he prayed, cargo shifted filling a hole that was leaking in water, and the ship drifted to safety. He saw this as God accepting him and his prayer and over time his life began to change, largely due to his reading of the Bible. Formerly he was known as the Great Blasphemer due to his foul language, denial of God and general debauched lifestyle but gradually even though he continued to sail on, captain and own slave ships for several years he felt God calling him. A cruel and ruthless trader of human beings, Newton began to regret his involvement in the slave trade and was instrumental in encouraging William Wilberforce to pursue his guest to have slavery abolished which was passed by Parliament in 1807. Newton wrote a pamphlet supporting the campaign, 'Thoughts upon the African Slave Trade', which was very influential. It graphically described the horrors of the Slave Trade and his role in it.

Newton was ordained into the Anglican priesthood in 1764 and served in the Buckinghamshire parish of Olney. So popular was his preaching that the church could not accommodate all those wishing to hear. He wrote the hymn Amazing Grace as an illustration for a sermon on God's grace.

Many will be familiar with the words:

Amazing Grace, how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me
I once was lost but now I'm found was blind but now I see.

Newton was seeking to express the wonder, the joy that became his as he understood God forgave him despite the life he had led for so many years and that if God could do it for him He can do it for anyone who asks. That simply put is the message and hope of Easter, God loves YOU so much that He became a man, lived on our earth what was a perfect life and yet was executed, unjustly in every human sense and died hanging on a cross. But 3 days later Jerusalem was alive with stories of Jesus's resurrection, over 500 people were able to testify that in the next few weeks they had seen, spoken to, shared meals with Jesus who was even more full of life, if that was possible, than He had been prior to his death.

Christians believe Jesus died to pay the price of our

wrongdoing, we all know we do wrong, and in so doing Jesus has taken away all barriers between us and God allowing us to experience an open phone line to heaven. It is not a relationship we instigate by any worth of our own it is all about God's gift to us, it's His Amazing Grace.

That's why Newton wrote what he did, it has become the hope and experience of countless millions worldwide and it can be yours this Easter too, just ask God "show me your Amazing Grace "and he will answer.

I think John Newton would have said "if Jesus can change me He can change anyone's life ".

May this be the best Easter you have ever known by finding God's gift of life.

A WILL THAT GAVE THEM THE HUMP

Jesus often told stories or parables to teach people about how they should behave towards each other or toward God. Writes Jenny Payne.

This story comes from the Middle East and is a sort of parable. I think it illustrates how Jesus wants us to be peacemakers.

Once upon a time there was a rich man who lived in the deserts of the Middle East. You could tell how rich he was because of the number of camels he owned. He was so rich that he owned not 2, not 4, not 8, not even 16 camels but 17 camels!

He led a peaceful and prosperous life and so when he was very old and near to death, he wrote his will, explaining how he intended to leave his wealth to his only son, his grandson and to his one nephew. In the will he stated that one half of his riches should go to his son, one third should go to his grandchild and one ninth of his wealth should go to his nephew.

This seemed very fair.

Soon after this, the rich man died. Now, when it came time to divide up the camels according to the will, the three relatives ran into a problem:

- * If half the camels were given to the son, he should get eight and half , which would mean killing a camel!
- * The grandson should get five and two thirds of the camels, which meant killing another came!
- When it came to the nephew, another would have to be killed for him to get his share!

The three men became frustrated and soon got incredibly angry with one another. They shouted and quarreled and argued and even threatened to go to war over the camels for they all knew that camels were far too precious to kill. Secretly, they began stockpiling their weapons and plotting their battle campaigns. Now, nearby there lived a very poor man, you could tell he was poor because he only owned one camel. Although he was so poor and seemed to have no influence, he still felt he should do something to help. He wanted to stop war breaking out. He wanted to be a peacemaker, but what could he do?

He decided to offer his one and only camel, all that he owned, into the rich man's inheritance to help sort out the problem. It was a

So, the inheritance now consisted of 18 camels.

huge sacrifice.

The three men sat down and did the sums again:

- Half of the 18 camels would go to the son, so he took 9 camels.
- One third of the 18 camels would go to the grandson, so he took 6 camels.
- And one ninth of the 18 would go to the nephew, so he got 2 camels.

To their great surprise, there was one camel left over, so the poor man received his camel back.

He had made peace between the men by his willingness to give up all he had and it made all the difference. This story reminds me of what Jesus did for all mankind when He died on the cross so that our sins can be forgiven. Jesus became the peacemaker between us and God, enabling us to come to Him, receive forgiveness for our sins and to live in peace with Him. Source Community Scene Easter 2021

Can't Get No Satisfaction

As a kid I liked the Rolling Stones. Why? Because my mum and dad were forever telling me how bad they were, scruffy, loud and worst of all, you can't hear the words. Obviously the more they disliked the Stones the more I liked them.

This led to me feeling I had a deprived fatherhood. My sons, born in the 70s and 80s, liked the Beatles and Oasis, nice songs and you could hear all the words. I never had that fatherly experience my dad had of banging on their bedroom door yelling "Turn that down," of course interspersed with some descriptive language about the artists' quality. In fact I relived my teenage years when my boys and wife insisted I turned down Jimi Hendrix and Maria Callas. OK I have an eclectic taste in music though jazz is not my thing.

Getting back to my mum and dad it always seemed to be a problem when I played quite quietly, from my point of view, the Stones "I can't get no satisfaction" released in 1965 when I was 14. For them, not being able to hear the words or not wanting to, left them at a disadvantage. They had judged the message of the words from the title, and so they never listened. And they were very fond of telling me "You can't judge a book by its cover." Their thinking was it reflected the frustrations of my teenage years and they were right, but wrong.

So why no satisfaction?

When I'm driving in my car And that man comes on the radio And he's telling me more and more About some useless information Supposed to fire my imagination Verse 2

When I'm watching my TV
And that man comes on to tell me
How white my shirts can be
Well he can't be a man cause he doesn't smoke
The same cigarettes as me
That's life according to advertising. I could never be a
success if I didn't possess this, wasn't doing that, didn't

dress like this, had the wrong body shape. I was forever

being told I was a failure because I didn't subscribe to their product or just couldn't afford it.

In a way we end up with a materialistic faith that satisfaction comes solely from what we own, what we have harvested through want. But that faith can never be satisfied, it's designed not to. *There is no profit in "I have got all I need."* We need to be encouraged to keep wanting.

Still why worry, we are all in the same boat, it's the way of the world. There is no other path is there? I don't want to be judged by people who have better tech, clothes, house, and holidays etc. Social media can be a very judgmental format. I've got to keep striving to stay in the materialistic harvest.

When asked "Tell me about yourself" people will tell you about their job, what they own, where they live. But that's not the question. The question is telling me about you, what really matters to you. What satisfaction does your life give you?


Perhaps there is another path.

Franky Dilch wrote in The Long journey to Here. "Burdened with debt, racked by anxiety from another day striving to maintain my materialistic life style I spent the evening relaxing with a bottle of quality red wine, worshipping the TV celebrity idols and those of sport on my state of the art Samsung QE55Q9FN a snip at £2499. At the same time I used social media — checking for likes and to amaze my friends and family how great my life was and how happy I am. In truth often I'm not happy in fact more often than not. I'm always searching for something there's no satisfaction. That evening after a few more glasses of wine I wrote on the wall with a black marker pen, in anguish, *I must be worth more than this,* and in the calm soft quiet of that night a voice whispered to me, it was Jesus and I simply asked him to be part of my life. Now I am on a new voyage. Strange really, this journey I thought should have been more difficult. But it's not. Every march however long starts with one single step, they say, this was a big step for me, but easy. I always have a companion, sometimes as we walk I lag behind, He never complains. Other times I rush off in sheer excitement of some new challenge but He doesn't have me on a lead. He doesn't call or whistle to bring me back to follow passively at His heels, although I am never out of His sight. In a way I haven't changed that much as a person, except before I was often lonely, lost, bereft of spirit and crushed by servitude to want and desire. Now I am constantly loved and free. I never could get the writing off the wall so I covered it with a big sign that said Jesus is welcome here. "Total satisfaction."

I have a lot to thank my mum and dad for, but mum would say to me quite often "Can't you take no for an answer?" I couldn't most of the time. Nor will

Jesus. He will be there for you waiting for you to say yes. He won't turn away and forget you, so just say "Yes" to Jesus and no longer feel
