

EBA Prayer Focus 21st August 2022 Wisbech Baptist Church

Nestled in the heart of The Fens in Cambridgeshire lies Wisbech Baptist Church.

While the fellowship consists of around 40 regulars on a Sunday, their community impact is far greater, as active partnerships with the local food bank and Christians Against Poverty help them to reach the needs of their community and bring the hope of the gospel to those who might not otherwise step foot inside a church.

The church is host to the food bank, and complements this with a weekly drop-in centre called Open Doors. Here they offer hot drinks, a listening ear and encouragement, as well as providing sign posting to other local service providers. It is hoped that in the future a new kitchen area can be installed, so that the work of Open Doors can be extended to offering free light meals to those in need.

The pandemic has inevitably taken its toll upon the church, with numbers decreasing slightly at services, but the vast majority have returned, despite the congregation mostly consisting of people who are older in years.

There is excitement around plans to start an afternoon café-style service on the second Sunday of each month, starting in September. The aim is open up the Christian faith to those who would not necessarily feel comfortable attending a traditional Sunday service.

Prayer points:

- Please pray for our Minister Revd Kevin Newton and the Deacons as they seek God's guidance in the months ahead.
- Please pray for the continued success of Open Doors. Pray for our plans with regard to the new kitchen area, that it will happen in God's perfect timing and in line with His will.
- Please pray for the Food Bank and for the many volunteers who make this service possible in Wisbech. Pray also that those who need to use this service would not only be blessed through the receiving of food – but also experience the love of Jesus.
- Please pray for the launch of our Café-style service in September.
- And finally, please pray for our weekly services, that as we come together as the Body of Christ we



would see more new people attending so that we can have the opportunity to do even more in our local community as we bring glory to God.



Something to read

When Jesus had come down from the mountain, great crowds followed him; and there was a leper who came to him and knelt before him, saying, 'Lord, if you choose, you can make me clean.' He stretched out his hand and touched him, saying, 'I do choose. Be made clean!'. Immediately his leprosy was cleansed. Then Jesus said to him, 'See that you say nothing to anyone; but go, show yourself to the priest, and offer the gift that Moses commanded, as a testimony to them.'

- Matthew 8:1-4.

Something to think about

It's surely no accident that the person who expresses doubt about Jesus' willingness to heal him is a leper. Here is someone who is used to being excluded and on the margins of society. He just accepts it. Everyone just accepts it. It's the way life is, the way life has to be.

We all need the world to be the way it is, for our part of it to carry on as normal. But once we accept this way of dealing with chronic problems in the world – like leprosy, or poverty – then all the urgency goes out of finding solutions. And those who live in poverty come to doubt whether the rest of humanity really is willing to find the solutions – while knowing (like this leper knew) that if only we were willing, we could change their situation. Jesus did not heal every leper in his day, or invent a cure for leprosy. But he helped this one. And in the process he changed attitudes – which in turn changed the world.

Something to do

Identify someone you come across frequently in your life, who others consider an 'outcast' like the leper in this passage. Try to have a conversation with them today. Don't be put off by the fact that they may not trust you. Try to establish a relationship and break down the barriers.

Thresia suffered from selfstigma, which held her back

Thresia's mother died when she was young and she was diagnosed with leprosy when she was eight. Due to slow treatment of leprosy, Thresia also developed an ulcer on her foot, which made it difficult to walk.

Many persons affected by leprosy experience shame because of the stigma surrounding the disease. Unfortunately, Thresia was no different.

Because of my leprosy I felt shy around my friends at school. When I found out I had leprosy I completely stopped going to school.

My friends stopped asking about me. When I saw my classmates in my community, I tried to hide from them. I was haunted by how they would tease me, so I avoided them altogether."

Thankfully, Thresia started to regain her confidence and return to her studies

When The Leprosy Mission began supporting me, my confidence began to grow. The Leprosy Mission Community Facilitator encouraged me to continue with my education.

Through the help of The Leprosy Mission, I felt confident enough to go back to school. When I returned to school having been cured of leprosy, my friends stopped teasing me.

"Before I heard about The Leprosy Mission, I had given up on going to school. But now I am continuing my education."

Now Thresia has an important message for other girls "I want to tell other girls affected by leprosy that 'I was like you.' I would encourage them to continue with their studies in spite of their leprosy and the discrimination they may receive.

"I now know that leprosy cannot stop me from pursuing my dreams."
