During October please pray for the residents of Broadbeach Gardens.

Foodbanks are facing their hardest winter yet as soaring demand fuelled by the rising cost of living outstrips donations.

Leading charity The Trussell Trust, which supports a network of 1,300 food bank centres, today launches an emergency appeal, warning that "the soaring cost of living is driving a tsunami of need to food banks".

The demand has been particularly acute over the past few months, with the charity distributing 46 per cent more emergency food parcels to banks in August and September compared to the same months in 2021. North Norfolk Foodbank in the year end March 2021 feed 4,300 or so this year to date over 3,000 have been fed. Lord we pray that the SBC Foodbank will be able to support those in need in our community through the winter.

Lord we pray that our government can sort out its internal problems quickly and focus on the needs of our nation. Lord we also pray for those in our fellowship and community whose quality of life is deteriorating as they wait for NHS operations.

Reading Isaiah 41:21-24 (MSG) Sham Gods This week Ron gives his take on the verses

21-24 "Set out your case for your gods," says GoD. "Bring your evidence," says the King of Jacob. "Take the stand on behalf of your idols, offer arguments, assemble reasons. Spread out the facts before us so that we can assess them ourselves. Ask them, 'if you are gods, explain what the past means - or, failing that, tell us what will happen in the future. Can't do that?

How about doing something—anything! Good or bad—whatever.

Can you hurt us or help us? Do we need to be afraid?

They say nothing, because they are nothing - sham gods, no-gods, fool-making gods."

EBA Prayer Focus 23rd October 2022 Parsons Heath Baptist Church

Parsons Heath is a suburb on the northeast edge of Colchester. Since 2016, the fellowship have been seeking new ways to be God's church within their community, streets, homes and families. For Parsons Heath, this meant a stepping back from building-based activities and stepping out as witnesses and servants from their homes and workplaces. COVID may have forced the fellowship at Parsons Heath to move from their ageing and restrictive building, but they took the bold decision to remain out of the building for the foreseeable future. The fellowship now meets via Zoom on Sundays and uses conventional and more interactive ways to worship God and support one another.

Twice weekly they gather for prayer. The fellowship sees this as a significant part of their calling. These times have an outward and missional focus, as they seek to live out God's heart for others. Once a month the fellowship meets face-toface at the manse. This encourages and builds community. Alongside and supporting these goals is a 'Link' magazine. Initiated during lockdown, it is distributed to all church contacts. This helps keeping in touch with the housebound and a wider pre-COVID congregation.

The fellowship are also using innovative means to prayerfully serve those around them. A stand offering free apples from church members' apple trees led to remarkable conversations, new contacts, and the sharing of faith.

'Preaching in BSL at St Paul's was a marked difference from my usual venues'

Baptist minister Sue Whalley delivered the first ever known sermon in British Sign Language (BSL) at St Paul's Cathedral on 25 September. She explains how this momentous occasion came about:

When I commenced my Baptist Ministry training at Northern Baptist College in Manchester in 2019, preaching at this place of worship was not what I expected to be doing on completion.

The Deaf Church in the Diocese of London had been led and nurtured by the Chaplain for the Deaf, Catherine Carlyon, who has since relocated to a hearing parish in the West Country in 2020. I was offered a placement under the Church of England when I was unable to find work with Deaf people in the Baptist Church in London.

Last May, a conference took place at St Katharine's in Limehouse between Deaf Church Leaders and Church of England Clergy to seek the way forward. As a result, it was felt that markers were needed in the London Calendar to focus on Deaf ministry.

Building on the momentum of the BSL Act last April (when British Sign Language was accepted as an official language in England and Wales) and recognising the International Week of Deaf people and International Day of Sign Languages in September; it was suggested that a Deaf person preach at St Paul's Cathedral. This would raise the profile, attract Diocesan attention, identifying with Deaf culture as well as marking my contribution to the Deaf ministry for the three-year duration of my placement. I recognised that this was an honour, but it was with some trepidation that I accepted this commission, accompanied by prayers of request for strength and wisdom.

Hence, I found myself at the Cathedral on the said morning feeling overwhelmed by the building and the occasion, but recognising this was an opportunity to get the Deaf Church under the wider radar. It was

also a blessing for Deaf people to have a sermon delivered in BSL instead of via a Sign Language Interpreter which takes place at St Paul's occasionally.

Deaf churches are far and few between nationally but an essential part of ministry as we seek to reach the marginalised and excluded with Deaf people travelling distances to take part in accessible services and have fellowship. The event at St Paul's was no different as people attended from Leeds, Derby and Bristol as well as in and around London.

For Deaf people, a sermon in BSL means receiving information first hand and not as an after-thought or delivered via a culture which they have struggled to understand and embrace. This topic was included

in the sermon content from Luke 16, covering the role reversal of the rich man and Lazarus as well as the distance between different people groups.

Preaching at St Paul's was a marked difference from my usual venue of halls, both secular and church, with a music stand, with a more informal and

relaxed format and smaller congregation. A maximum of 30 Deaf people were expected to attend alongside the hearing visitors to the cathedral, and we were blown away that approximately between 60-70 Deaf people turned up, highlighting the importance and significance of the event.

Many people have asked where I go from here, in truth, I do not know. I am delighted that my fellow students have been ordained, but jobs for disabled Baptist ministers or work with specialist groups are rarely advertised.

I seek to find a hub where Deaf people can worship, learn, grow, not just spiritually, but mentally and physically. This would take place in the form of Deaf church, bible-studies, Messy Church, mother and toddler groups for both deaf babies and their Deaf parents, among other activities. Through these, Deaf people can learn that the all-encompassing love of Jesus is not just about spiritual salvation but about the whole person, at a place where they are truly welcome and communication is not a barrier. Where people are identified as Joe, Beulah and Assaf, without labels belonging to specific groups. This is my vision of a new heaven and earth where all are recognised equally as people of God.

Still others had trial of mocking's and scourging's, yes, and of chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, were tempted, were slain with the sword. They wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, tormented, of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, in dens and caves of the earth.

Something to think about

Later in the letter to the Hebrews, the writer explains that he has written to them because he wants to encourage them.

Forgive me, but I think that I might have excluded some of these lines from a letter of encouragement! This is very strong stuff. The reminder that the heroes of the faith were brutally tortured at times and even murdered for their faith isn't the normal way in which I go about encouraging people!

However, the writer to the Hebrews writes in this way precisely because he wants the people in his congregation to be full of courage as they face the challenges of their day.

He wanted literally to en-courage them.

He doesn't want them to have any illusions. It is clear that in the church at the time there was persecution and some people had wandered away from the faith. They needed to be reminded of those who had gone before them and of the extraordinary courage that they had shown.

By ourselves most of us are timid and weak. We lack courage, even to face the most mundane challenges. But if we are to be effective for God

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today we will need courage and we need the inspiration of those who have gone before us.

Something to do

The problems of our society and our world are immense.
Totally overwhelming. Reflect on

one thing that you can do today that will help one other person, and then pray for the courage to do something about it.

Something to pray

Lord we want to be honest with you. We are often timid and fearful, and we would much rather avoid challenges and problems than face them. Grant to us your wisdom so that we will face every challenge with courage and with grace.

Help us to support others who are facing big problems in their lives. Help us to be true encouragers to them.

Thank you for the way in which you have given courage to people through thousands of years, and please grant us your courage today.

We pray this in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.
