If God didn't hesitate to put everything on the line for us, embracing our condition and exposing himself to the worst by sending his own Son, is there anything else he wouldn't gladly and freely do for us? And who would dare tangle with God by messing with one of God's chosen? Who would dare even to point a finger? The One who died for us—who was raised to life for us!—is in the presence of God at this very moment sticking up for us. Do you think anyone is going to be able to drive a wedge between us and Christ's love for us? There is no way! Not trouble, not hard times, not hatred, not hunger, not homelessness, not bullying threats, not backstabbing, not even the worst sins listed in Scripture: They kill us in cold blood because they hate you.

We're sitting ducks; they pick us off one by one.

None of this fazes us because Jesus loves us. I'm absolutely convinced that nothing—nothing living or dead, angelic or demonic, today or tomorrow, high or low, thinkable or unthinkable—absolutely *nothing* can get between us and God's love because of the way that Jesus our Master has embraced us.

As Christians what do we think, when all around us the darkness is closing in there seems no way of finding any light, do we think absolutely nothing can get between us and God's love?

Romford lies just inside the M25 on the eastern edge of greater London. Salem Baptist Church has been a presence in Romford town centre since it was founded in 1836 and is one of the oldest Baptist churches in this part of Essex.

The current pastor - Rev Claudiu Nitisor - has been at the church for the past five years and seen new people joining and attending in that time.

During covid the building was closed, but everything is now back to normal. Something to read

Then Jesus laid His hands on his eyes again; and he looked intently and his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly.

- Mark 8:25.

Something to think about

This verse is taken from the account of Jesus giving sight to a blind man. What always strikes me as strange is that Jesus needs two attempts to heal the man and I've often wondered why! There may be many possibilities, but I want to think of two.

The first is that the man's sight is so bad that there is a lot of work to do and Jesus needs to have a second attempt to complete the work. The second is that the man himself was not really sure that this healing was going to work so was unwilling to recognise the incredible work Jesus had done.

Both of these ideas have lessons for us of course. There are times when we are so far away from God that we need to work hard to get back into a relationship. Not that God is holding back from us, but the further away we have allowed ourselves to go, the harder we may have to work to reach God's arms which are reaching out for us.

The second idea is that we need to recognise what incredible work God has done in us and all around us, and what incredible work God can do through us. In all things we must strive to grow closer to God and to recognise signs of God's presence and glory all around us.

Something to do

Think of the things where our lack of trust or commitment is distancing us from God and ask for these things to be broken down. Of course, to do this we have to work with God and want these things broken down so that we can get closer to the Lord.

Something to pray

Lord Jesus give me clear vision to see you at all times and a willingness to trust you. Amen.

Something to think about

I think this verse is another great challenge, primarily because it reminds me of the amount of times I fail to seek the Lord as I should! And I wonder how many of us can relate to that?

We will talk about God's promises to us, love for us and the new life that God brings to us and yet, sometimes, we try to rely on our own will or strength to do something. With that often comes a lack of confidence leading to hesitation and anxiety and, all the time, God must be waiting, frustrated, at our failure to turn to him.

This verse is a reminder that in all things we can trust God and that in all situations we can turn to the Lord and pray for strength and power, comfort and protection, wisdom and love. I think that the church today is often lacking in confidence and we are nervous about speaking out for justice and peace for fear of whom we might offend.

Well, we can be confident because God has done all that is needed for us to be so - confident in sharing the good news of Jesus, confident in standing up for what is right, for seeking to protect those who are less able to protect themselves and confident to tell people they are special and they are loved, just as each one us in God's eyes, is special and loved.

Something to do

Think of something in your life, and then in your church, where a lack of confidence in God's strength, power and love is holding something back. Pray for God's power to overcome that lack of confidence and move forward with trust.

Something to pray

Lord Jesus you promise to be with me always. Help me to remember that promise and that nothing is too big or too small to bring before you. Amen.

Brazil election: What the results of the first round mean for indigenous communities and

the environment 4 October 2022

On Sunday Brazilians voted in a presidential election that hinges on a decision between two main candidates. The country's current far-right leader Jair Bolsonaro is being challenged by left-wing former president Luiz Inacio 'Lula' da Silva, and the identity of the winner is of vital importance to Brazil's indigenous peoples.

As neither Bolsonaro nor Lula achieved an overall majority in the first round of voting, a run-off between the two will be held on 30 October.

Bishop Dom Roque, from our Brazilian partner CIMI (the Indigenist Missionary Council), says: "The second round will involve a huge debate between the two candidates. We trust that, during the run-up to the vote, it will be possible to discuss the country that we have and the country that we want."

Deforestation has increased radically under Bolsonaro. While Bolsonaro has been in office, legal protection of human rights and the environment has been eroded. Since winning the presidential election in 2018, Bolsonaro has dismantled existing environmental agencies and the Indigenous Affairs Agency (FUNAI), leading to increased deforestation and the loss of indigenous lives.


Deforestation in the Brazilian Amazon broke all records during the first half of this year. This has been particularly devastating for the Yanomami, an indigenous people living in the Amazon in northern Brazil.

Lula, on the other hand, has proposed to reverse spiralling deforestation rates by encouraging environmental protections and a transition from ranching to farming on degraded pastureland, setting Brazil back on course as a global player in the fight against climate change. Lula has pledged to protect indigenous lands.

Bolsonaro's government is the only regime since 1985 that has not officially recognised any indigenous lands. The to come. current president has gone even further, proposing new laws that threaten to take away indigenous ancestral rights to land and to allow mining on indigenous lands. Bishop Dom Rogue explains: "We have already gone four

years without recognising a single inch of indigenous land. On the contrary, the invasion, subdivision and destruction of indigenous lands that had already been officially registered has been a constant."

In contrast, Lula's party has proposed to revoke these life-



threatening decrees, and create an indigenous department within government, to ensure that their rights to land, health, bi-lingual education and cultural preservation as enshrined in the Brazilian constitution are upheld. Lula tweeted in April: "Indigenous peoples have the right to claim what they believe in and cannot be subjected to violence. This country has a

lot of land and it is not necessary to destroy indigenous territories to mine or plant food crops."

Illegal gold mining threatens lives.

Indigenous communities, like the Yanomami and the Ye'kwana, play a crucial role in protecting the Amazon rainforest, defending against climate change and keeping the forest standing. Recognition of indigenous lands is extremely important as land means life to indigenous peoples - without it, they have no water, food, livelihoods, culture or future.

But instead, indigenous communities face violence for

protecting their lands. They are being forced to flee their homes and are suffering irreversible damage from mercury poisoning, which is used in the extraction of gold by illegal goldminers. Protection from the government against illegal gold mining is vitally needed.

The election is a crucial moment for Brazil's indigenous peoples.

CAFOD's partner organisations in Brazil view the current situation with extreme concern.

Mauricio Ye'kwana, from CAFOD partner HAY, which works to protect the rights of the Yanomami and Ye'kwana and the Amazon rainforest, told us that indigenous organisations will become even weaker if Bolsonaro remains in power: "The tendency is to intimidate and persecute indigenous peoples' organisations, especially those who are fighting and reporting illegal mining and the invasion of indigenous lands."

Mauricio also emphasises the importance of international action, saying that the international community must continue its pressure on Brazil to consult with indigenous people, and avoid purchasing gold from Brazil Dom Roque told us: "It is dark but we want to sing, to cherish the dreams, the hope and the certainty that we must have peace, overcome the backwardness and be able to invest in a country that needs to believe in education, in the paths of solidarity and respect of differences, and above all in the valuing of this great wealth that are the original, indigenous, riverside and African descendant peoples in this Amazon region."

After decades of struggle the Yanomami and Ye'kwana finally gained official recognition and registration of their land in 1992. Thirty years later, they face yet another fight in this crucial election year that could determine their future, and that of the Amazon rainforest, for generations
