I spoke to 111 three times and a hospital doctor rang and booked him an appointment for 8.30 a.m. this morning.

Our son David is taking him to Broomfield hospital to be checked out as I'm unable to drive at the moment.

I'll update you as and when he has been seen at the hospital. God bless, Norma." Later in the day Jerry posted from Norma "Hi everyone, David is back home. He had an ECG and blood tests at Broomfield hospital. They said the blood tests were all to do with the heart. The hospital advised David that they are writing to the doctor and they want him to have a 24-hour heart monitor. So we are still none the wiser as to why he was so nauseous and why he was so weak, faint and feverish.

I'll let you all know when we have the result of the 24-hour heart monitoring. Thank you all for your prayers. They obviously seem to be effective and answered positively, for which we thank the Lord. God bless, From Norma (& David) "

On Sunday DJ Steve posted an audio message "Hi everybody, just like to say thankyou for your prayers I'm not too good at the moment but I'm going to keep positive and tomorrow I'm going to be speaking to my advocate, can you pray for me that the phone call goes well. All the best DJ."

He also isn't sleeping too well and has got a continuous cough. He needs to have 24 hr heart monitor and is still waiting for the monitor to be delivered." Later that day Jane posted "Kevin's op has been postponed sorry. Thank you for praying."

On Tuesday Jerry posted "Update from Norma: We're back from the surgery. David saw an Urgent care nurse practitioner, and she gave him antibiotics as there was a crackle in his chest and a nasal spray for his nose. She has also referred him to the hospital for an appt for 24 hr ECG monitor. So good result today at the surgery.

Breakfast Info from Geoff

Hi Gents, thanks for your generous support for in our first three "new generation"

breakfasts. Just so you know we take just the bare cost of the ingredients out of your donations and I thought you might like to see the first part of my mission report to the recent church meeting:

"I'm going to start with a slight sideways mention.
Yesterday we had the 3rd in a new series of Men's
Breakfasts which have been well attended with 20 plus
gents sharing the meal together each time. Some of
these are regular congregation members but the number
has included invited family and neighbours which I think
is really good.

There is no specific charge for breakfast but a donation box is available and I'm happy to say well used. As organiser of the breakfast and our mission rep I decreed all monies over the cost of food will go to a mission project. To date: From the first £90–56 went to the work of the Shrubsoles (in Chad), from the second £87–58 to the work of the Mahons (in Peru), and from yesterday's £102–96 will go to support the Browns (in Thailand). "This time I've chosen the BMS Afghan appeal for the donations.

We had, as one of our BMS Partners, a family working in Afghanistan until a couple of years ago. Their prayers continue for their former workmates from BMS and partner organisations helping the folk in the country areas where most are poor and badly cared for. This has only increased since the Taliban takeover with most women & girls denied the right to work and be educated. This makes life hard for the BMS and partner workers several of whom are women.

This is why I have chosen to send our donation to those trying to continue the work to help those struggling to

look after their families at this difficult time.

How to Donate to the Earthquake appeals

Emergency services, volunteers and members of the public in <u>Turkey</u> and <u>Syria</u> continue desperately searching through rubble for survivors after two powerful <u>earthquakes</u> hit the region on Monday. The death toll from the disaster has already soared above 16,000, although officials fear this <u>could rise</u> to around 20,000 after houses, apartment blocks and offices <u>were completely flattened by the quakes</u> and subsequent tremors.

Amid the horror, despair and grief there are occasional moments of hope and joy, including a newborn baby girl rescued from under a collapsed building with her umbilical cord still attached. But amid the freezing cold winter conditions, rescuers are warning that time to recover the remaining survivors is running out, with fears that hundreds of people could still be trapped under the debris.

The UK government has already sent a team of search and rescue experts to help the authorities in Turkey.

Here's how you can help

Thousands of people have been left homeless by the quake and will struggle to access shelter, water and food. They require emergency aid, particularly in war -torn Syria, which is already in the grip of a humanitarian crisis due to more than a decade of war.

On Wednesday afternoon the Disaster Emergency Committee (DEC) announced it had launched a campaign. The DEC is an umbrella group of UK charities that coordinates and launches collective of appeals to raise funds to provide emergency aid and rapid relief to people caught up in disasters and humanitarian crises around the world.

"DEC charities and their local partners are among the first responders, working with locally

-led relief efforts. Immediate priorities are medical treatment for the injured, shelter for those who have lost their

homes, as well as blankets, warm clothes and heaters for safe spaces," it said in a statement.

"They are also ensuring people have enough food and clean water." You can donate to the DEC campaign here.

The British Red Cross has launched appeals for both Turkey and Syria. Those who are able to are being asked to donate via the Red Cross website.

Alternatively, you can donate by calling 0300 004 0339 or by downloading a postal form here.

The humanitarian organisation is working with partners in the region to provide emergency aid to those most in need. "The Turkish Red Crescent (Kizilay) has launched a crisis response operation and mobilised teams in more than 10 regions across

the country, while the Syrian Arab Red Crescent is delivering assistance and support to those in need in the regions of Hama, Aleppo and Lattakia," it said in a statement.

"Together, we're providing emergency first aid and evacuating people to safety."

Actionaid has also launched a campaign calling for donations.

Money donated to the charity will be used to provide "food, medical aid, warm clothing, heaters and cash for those who have lost their homes and are out on the streets." You can donate to Actionaid's campaign by following this link.

Oxfam is also calling for donations.

"Our teams in Türkiye (Turkey) and Syria are working with partner organisations to assess the types of immediate and longer-term support that are needed to help people in the aftermath of Monday's devastating earthquakes," the charity said in a statement.

"The emergency response is expected to include water and sanitation, shelter and food support as well as longer-term rehabilitation and reconstruction."

Save the Children is also working with partners across northwest Syria and Turkey. "Together, we're assessing what children and their families need, so we can deliver emergency relief," the charity said in a statement.

"But we urgently need your help.

"You can help us get families the food, warm blankets, winter clothes and shelter materials they need to survive.

"You can help us set up safe spaces for women and children, and get psychological support to children so they can start to process their terrible experiences."

Doctors Without Borders/Médecins Sans
INDEPENDENT Frontières (MSF) is also working in
northwest Syria and Turkey to provide life
-saving medical care.

"In the first hours of the disaster, our teams treated around 200 wounded and we received 160 casualties in the facilities and the clinics that we run or support in northern Idlib," says Sebastien Gay, MSF head of mission in Syria. "Our ambulances are also deployed to assist people."

Unicef said in a statement it is "preparing to support the humanitarian response in coordination with partners. "The immediate focus is on ensuring affected children and families have access to safe drinking water and sanitation services – critical in preventing illness in the early days of a crisis," it said.
