Friday 19th January Diana posted "Hello my church Family. Went for my 1st post chemo check this morning. All seems to be good. My blood results are back within normal range. My lymph nodes normal and so is my spleen. As you know I had more aggressive treatment because of the PET scan showing something else going on. Although they couldn't biopsy, they are almost certain it was a transformation to high grade which does happen in 25% of cases. The upshot of that and my treatment is that its highly likely the high grade was cured but the low grade which was still showing in my bone marrow biopsy will at some point return. Professor Bowles is hopeful for at least a 5-year remission period. At least I now do know the early warning signs, which seem to start 3/4 months before it becomes necessary to treat. Thank you all for your prayers and your support.

Jerry's Bible Reading Blog Luke 6: 43-49 (MSG) Work the Words Into Your Life

43-45 "You don't get wormy apples off a healthy tree, nor good apples off a diseased tree. The health of the apple tells the health of the tree. You must begin with your own life-giving lives. It's who you are, not what you say and do, that counts. Your true being brims over into true words and deeds.

46-47 "Why are you so polite with me, always saying 'Yes, sir,' and 'That's right, sir,' but never doing a thing I tell you? These words I speak to you are not mere additions to your life, homeowner improvements to your standard of living. They are foundation words, words to build a life on.

48-49 "If you work the words into your life, you are like a smart carpenter who dug deep and laid the foundation of his house on bedrock. When the river burst its banks and crashed against the house, nothing could shake it; it was built to last. But if you just use my words in Bible studies and don't work them into your life, you are like a dumb carpenter who built a house but skipped the foundation. When the swollen river came crashing in, it collapsed like a house of cards. It was a total loss."

EBA Weekly Prayer Focus 28th January Maldon Baptist Church

Maldon is an ancient Essex town and was once a thriving port where the Rivers Chelmer and Blackwater converge before continuing their journey to the sea. The town is growing with new housing developments springing up on the outskirts. Maldon Baptist Church was founded in 1872 and has very large buildings near the town centre.

The current congregation is small and mainly older, and numbers, while stable, have not returned to pre-covid levels. The church is led by Secretary Richard Lewis and Moderator Rev Michael Child (from Witham Baptist Church). Sunday services are mainly led by Richard and Michael and a faithful group of visiting speakers from other churches. There is a weekday programme which include a Bible study meeting and a bi-monthly bereavement group. On Thursdays there is a TWAM meeting (Tools with a Mission — a Christian charity that primarily collects unwanted usable tools, refurbishes

them, and sends them to the developing world for livelihood creation).

Despite large and deteriorating premises, the church has big plans for revitalising the work in Maldon and have established a mission team from outside resources to look at new opportunities and otential for mission in the town. Plans are currently

outside resources to look at new opportunities and the potential for mission in the town. Plans are currently at the feasibility stage to redevelop the church premises into a multi-use space for more than just Sundays and also convert part of the sprawling buildings to new residential properties to fund the project. And there are ideas being worked through to take on a pioneer minister to plant a new congregation among the people coming into the new housing developments or for a missioner to work in the town.

The church has an ambitious vision and requests prayer for:

- Wisdom in knowing God's leading about the buildings and premises.
- That the leaders and members may have boldness to accept the challenge of change.
- The members, deacons and mission team at this time of uncertainty.
- Activities and participation with Churches Together in Maldon.

The importance of giving and receiving challenge

Few of us enjoy criticism or confrontation. Yet the limitations and shortcomings of our humanness mean that it needs to happen – for our own good and for the wellbeing of the people we lead, writes Alan Wilson It probably took at least as much out of him as it did out of me. He was (and still is) my friend and at the time was an elder in the church where I was a young pastor. To say I had embarked on the pastorate with little experience would be an understatement, and at the time of our conversation things were not going terribly well. It was a Friday morning and he had a little piece of paper on which he had written down a list of half a dozen or so areas where he felt I needed to improve. There was no vindictiveness, no desire to run me down. Just the genuine concern of a brother for a floundering leader.

Giving and receiving challenge in Scripture

It's not easy to embark on such difficult conversations with a friend. It's not easy to confront a leader. And it is not always easy for a leader to receive challenge. Few of us enjoy criticism or confrontation. Yet the limitations and shortcomings of our humanness mean that it needs to happen – for our own good and for the wellbeing of the people we lead.

Scripture is clear, not least in the book of Proverbs, that our ability to receive correction is a sign of wisdom. The wise person will love the friend who brings reproof. The person of understanding will grow from it. Open rebuke is better than hidden love.

The New Testament leaves us with no allusions about the early church leaders. Acts doesn't cover over the sharp disagreement between Paul and Barnabas and Galatians lays bare another dramatic leader disagreement when Paul confronts Peter. In Paul's view Peter had caved to peer pressure and lapsed into hypocrisy. The issue was who he would eat with during his visit to Antioch. At one point he happily shared with Gentiles, but when 'certain men' arrived from Jerusalem, fear led him to pull back. Paul called him out in front of the whole gathering.

When is giving and receiving challenge needed?

Paul had two reasons for what he did and they are still relevant. For one thing Peter's behaviour had an impact on others. Even Barnabas, renowned for his openheartedness, wavered. The other reason was gospelrelated: Peter's conduct had drifted out of alignment with the gospel. Paul's gospel was clear: grace came freely through Christ and had nothing to do with the food you ate or the people you ate with. Peter's behaviour betrayed the simplicity and the radical nature of the gospel. We're left wondering how Peter must have felt about this, but it challenges us about the nature of our relationships and our willingness to engage in those hard conversations where the gospel has been jeopardised or where a leader's behaviour is likely to harm others.

I've been reading a preview copy of a new book from Justin Irving on organisational leadership. He starts with the area of self-leadership, and challenges readers on their relationships. As leaders we need 'relationships in which [we] can both challenge and be challenged, love and be loved, know and be known.'

Importance of humility and courage

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It seems to me that these relationships call for both humility and courage. We need the humility to realise our limitations and shortcomings and allow others to speak into them. We need the courage to lay ourselves open and genuinely invite the faithful wounds of friends. Similarly, if we find ourselves needing to speak into someone's life (as my friend did all those years

ago), we need the humility to check our heart motives and not assume some kind moral or professional superiority. And we need the courage to risk the possibility of being on the receiving end of anger or rejection. None of us is the finished article. When we assume we are, that we have arrived, that we have nothing more to learn, or that somehow we have graduated beyond the things that lesser mortals need to think about, we are in trouble. Seeking challenge

I remember a conversation I had a few years ago with a younger – though already quite accomplished – leader. He wanted to ask me something I don't think anyone else has ever asked me. He was in a good place, fruitful and well-accepted in his work. But he wanted to know how could he intentionally leave space for the voices of those who might be critical of him or disagree with his work.

I wonder how many of us would risk that? How many of us have the kind of relationships where we are not threatened by the honest feedback of others, nor are we afraid to give it?

Wounds from a friend can be trusted. They are still wounds, but they can be the key to our growth.

Muzaffarpur Hospítal - a refuge for the least, the last and the lost

Living in the shadows of society in Bihar - one of India's poorest State - are the least, the last and the lost. People affected by leprosy who are ignored and excluded. These are the very people Jesus showed love to and served in

his earthly life. People like Rajisha.

Rajisha lives with her parents and three siblings in Nirmali in Bihar. Her future looked positive. Bright and eager to learn, her proud parents hoped Rajisha's intelligence and schooling would give her a route out of poverty.

But then Rajisha began to notice changes to her body that she didn't understand. Strange marks appeared on her face and her fingers stiffened and started to bend inwards. She had a bad open sore on her finger that just

would not heal. Thankfully for Rajisha, her parents took her to a doctor who was visiting the village. He told her she had leprosy. Rajisha will never forget that moment. She had heard of leprosy, yet it was always spoken of in hushed tones. Suddenly the world was a dark place.

Rajisha started taking tablets to cure her leprosy. But sadly, the medicine came too late to prevent nerve damage which stole the feeling in her hands. By now, her fingers bent so far

into her palms that Rajisha couldn't even feed herself.

In the midst of despair came a glimmer of hope. The same visiting doctor told Rajisha's parents about The Leprosy Mission's Muzaffarpur Hospital. Despite being 100km away, the doctor had heard of the exemplary medical care that was available free of charge.

Rajisha's parents couldn't go to the hospital with her. Her mother was too poorly to travel, and her father couldn't afford to take time off work. The journey was frightening, not knowing what was going to happen.

Rajisha waited anxious and alone for many hours outside the crumbling Outpatients building. Despite her exhausting journey, there was nowhere to sit inside. Instead, she waited in the oppressive heat. Hours later, a doctor saw Rajisha. He was kind and began tending to her severe medical needs. She was admitted and a week later, well enough to have surgery on her right hand to straighten her fingers. In time she will need to have the procedure on her left hand as well.

At just 18, Rajisha's dreams of escaping poverty disappeared with a devastating leprosy diagnosis. The

disease stole the use of her hands and left her depressed and hopeless.

Can you imagine the fear and anxiety she felt, travelling 100km alone to Muzaffarpur? She didn't know the place or if she'd get the care she needed. Thankfully, Rajisha was given a warm welcome at the hospital. She was so thankful for the loving and caring staff. They became like family to her.

But the hospital needs urgent attention so that the team can continue to give people the welcome and the

treatment they deserve. The need is great, and it's increasing. Leprosy rates are three times higher in Bihar than anywhere else in India. Extreme poverty means leprosy cases are rising.

Every day over 600 people queue in the fierce sun or monsoon rains, desperate for leprosy treatment. The hospital was built 40 years ago and rooves have holes, walls are crumbling, and infrastructure needs to be modernised.

The current state of the Outpatient Department is alarming. It floods during monsoon, offers no proper shelter or seating for waiting patients, and is woefully cramped. It urgently needs rebuilding otherwise the future of Muzaffarpur Hospital is in jeopardy. This is the only

place in Bihar where people affected by leprosy can receive free and compassionate care.

The Leprosy Mission is raising money to rebuild a new Outpatient Department at Muzaffapur. By doing so the amazing medics can continue to rebuild the lives and hopes of people like Rajisha.

Your gift of just £36 will provide a tonne of bricks for the restoration. £188 would supply two tonnes of cement. If you're able

to give more, £442 would fund reconstructive surgery and hospital care for someone like Rajisha. A gift of £2,008 would cover a labourer's wages for the entire build. A gift of £9,275 will build and equip a new consultation room.
