Jonah's Prayer for Salvation (Jonah 2: 2-9)

We may never be swallowed by a great fish, but we can still experience the shame and regret that Jonah felt after he ran from God. The prophet's plea to the Father provides a poignant scaffolding for our own prayers of repentance. And remember that God heard and answered this humble, honest prayer:

"In my distress I called to the Lord, and he answered me. From deep in the realm of the dead I called for help, and you listened to my cry. You hurled me into the depths, into the very heart of the seas, and the currents swirled about me; all your waves and breakers swept over me. I said, 'I have been banished from your sight; yet I will look again toward your holy temple.' The engulfing waters threatened me, the deep surrounded me; seaweed was wrapped around my head. To the roots of the mountains, I sank down; the earth beneath barred me in forever. But you, Lord my God, brought my life up from the pit."

EBA Weekly Prayer Focus 7th April **Barton Baptist Church**

Barton Baptist Church, Cambridge feel very excited and blessed to be this week's EBA prayer focus. They are a small church that has almost doubled in size to a fellowship of around twenty-two people in the last two years. They are situated close to the local church school, which is very receptive to interactions with the church. Sally Daggianti became the pastor of Barton Baptist Church in October last year, but has been with the church since 2022. Her pastoral heart for evangelism is visible in what the church is doing but also in her history as a primary school teacher. She came to Barton with her husband, who balances being church treasurer with his prophetic art! They are both part of the children's outreach team. Sally loves going to the school and taking assemblies a couple of times a term, which are very fun and interactive.

On Maundy Thursday the church had their Easter event. The school encourages the families to come to church as they leave for the Easter holidays. Just a quick walk down the alley, they found the church with Easter egg hunt and craft stations retelling the Easter story. They all left with a Real Easter egg and Bible Society material.

During the week, Tea and Chat runs for the over 55s, with around fifteen people attending. It has been wonderful to see some of them start attending on a Sunday as well. Prayer meetings are regular as they are the heart of the church.

Coming up is the start of a weekly Little Mustard Seed which will be just after school drop off in the morning and will cater for parents and pre-school children. They will

find many activities, some from messy church as well as refreshment. There will be clothes available for the children, either to swap or just take, as well as books, including Christian ones. 

Why are Christian women more vulnerable during Ramadan?

Shame, abandonment and financial hardship. These are some of the dangers that face women and

girls in Central Asia who make the brave decision to leave Islam to follow Jesus. And during Ramadan, the risk can be greater – which is when the three stories below happened.

Nargena* was gathered at an underground house church in Central Asia when her son, Mehmad*, barged in and verbally abused everyone. He was furious that she was at a Christian meeting, whilst he continued to follow the Islamic customs that he'd been raised with – since Nargena had converted from Islam to follow Jesus.

He was particularly angry because it was Ramadan – a month of fasting for Muslim people, which concludes next week with Eid al-Fitr. It's a time when converts like Nargena can be particularly vulnerable, even from their own family.

"You're shaming me, your mother," Nargena said to her son. "If you are a real Muslim, you should know that the Quran says to respect your parents!" Mehmad stopped shouting, but he remained angry. He grabbed his mother's hand and, leading her out of the house, he kicked the woman who was sat next to her.

In many countries and regions, particularly those where Islamic culture is dominant, women are treated as secondclass citizens. Nargena would be expected to obey her male relatives, even her son. When Mehmad started persecuting his mother for her faith, he took advantage of this cultural norm – knowing that his mother would have little defence.

Taunted by own family

In many incidents of persecution against women and girls,

the shame comes alongside other tactics, like abandonment by their own families. Given the dependency our sisters have on male relatives as breadwinners, this can in turn bring the additional challenge of financial hardship. It's a situation familiar for Zarina*, who lives elsewhere in Central Asia. She has been expelled

from her home by her Muslim husband after she decided to follow Jesus, who said that he did not need such 'disgrace' in his old age. Her daughter and son-in-law have also cut her off. She is currently living with a woman from her church. As well as severely impacting her livelihood, Zarina – as a woman in this culture – is deeply affected by being tarnished and shamed by the label of 'disgrace'.

Baria* is much younger but her experience carries similar undertones. After she became a Christian, she was expelled from home by her Muslim parents and relatives, who have verbally abused her and taunted her that

she will never get married or give birth to 'normal' children. The experience has left her devastated.

Why are Christian women and girls are particularly vulnerbale to persecution?

All three of these incidents have happened during Ramadan. Believers can stand out for not engaging with rituals, exposing them to

attack, whilst it is also a time when more extreme Muslims are particularly likely to show hostility towards Christians. Women stand out if they choose not to wear Islamic dress, such as the hijab – one woman in the wider region told an Open Doors partner, "We, as women, are forced to wear a veil during Ramadan, because we converted to Christianity in secret." She shared that she feels less vulnerable during the rest of the year. **Honoured by God**

Open Doors' ongoing <u>See. Change</u> campaign seeks to come alongside women like Nargena, Zarina and Baria to support them in their challenges and show them how, contrary their awful experiences, they are seen and honoured by God. The campaign is only possible because of the prayers and gifts of supporters like you – thank you! And as Ramadan ends next week, please remember your sisters in your prayers. Good Friday witness walk in Sheringham

Over a hundred people from Sheringham churches took part in the Good Friday Walk of Witness to erect the wooden cross on nearby Beeston Hill. Tony Rothe reports.

The crowd set off from **St Peter's Parish Church** under threatening skies, and walked to the Clock Tower in Sheringham town centre for a time of worship led by **Sheringham Salvation Army** band, *pictured right*.

They then followed the cross, carried by young people from Lighthouse Community Church, through the town, *below right*, and along the winding path to the top of Beeston Hill, negotiating the broken steps as they climbed to the top of the local landmark.

The cross was then erected and secured on top of the hill, and a time of worship followed, remembering the sacrifice made by Jesus for the salvation of the world. The cross will remain in position throughout the Easter period as a visible reminder of the significance of the weekend.
