We Shall Remember Them

Reginald Smith was born in Stalham and was the son of James and Laura Smith and husband of Dorothy May Smith.

Reginald joined the 18th Division 4th Battalion Norfolk Regiment as a Private and was shipped to defend Singapore. On the 8th February 1942 the British Lieutenant General Arthur E. Percival surrendered to the Japanese and Reginald was one of 136.000 men who laid down their arms. The surrender of Singapore has been seen as one of the greatest military disasters in British history.

He was held in a prisoner of war camp, where forced labour was the norm. In July 1944 he was placed on a Japanese cargo ship the Hofku Maru with other POWs, destined for Japan. The POWs were to be used as slave workers, to replace the Japanese men in the armed services. The Hofuku Maru was sailing from Singapore to, Borneo as part of a convoy. The convoy consisted of 10 ships, 5 of which carried, in total, 5,000 POWs, all in appalling conditions.

At Borneo, the Hofuku Maru left the convoy with engine problems, and sailed on to the Philippines, arriving on July 19th. She remained in Manila until mid-September while the engines were repaired. The POWs remained on board, suffering terribly from disease, hunger, and thirst. On September 20th, 1944, the Hofuku Maru and 10 other ships formed Convoy, and sailed from Manila to Japan. The following morning, the convoy was attacked by more than 100 American carrier planes. All eleven ships in the convoy were sunk. Of those on the Hofuku Maru, 1,047 of the 1,289 British and Dutch POWs on board died. One of them was Reginald Smith aged 24.

It is estimated that over 30,000 Japanese held POWS died during WW2 of disease, starvation and mistreatment.
