Jesus and Politics

Jesus's life ended with a political execution, crucifixion, which the Romans used against subversives and chronically defiant slaves. He talked about the Kingdom of Heaven and the differentials between rich and poor. When asked a question by a wealthy man, Jesus answered, "If you want to be perfect, then go and sell all that you own. Give the money to the poor, and you will have riches in heaven. Then come and follow me!" The man walked away. John D Barry wrote. "The currency of Jesus' kingdom is different than ours. Jesus' economy is based on self-sacrifice and His currency love. For Jesus, belief and actions are one and the same—you cannot have one without the other. The more I reflect on the problem of poverty—and what Jesus had to say about it—the more I realize that we own the problems of the impoverished as much as they do. Our inactions have created many of them. We—all of us—are at fault for the state of our world. But we can also join Jesus in changing the state of our world." Candlelight Service

SBC Christmas celebrations start with the Candlelight service on Sunday 15th December beginning at 6pm. This is a very traditional carol service with all those much-loved carols. The music will be played by the SBC musicians that include guitars, bass, organ, drums and violin and will feature solos by some of the younger members of SBC and carols by the church singers. This atmospheric service in the candlelight, Christmas decorated Church, captures, rekindles and creates memories old and new.

Christmas Carols at the Swan Inn

Is on Monday 16th December at the Swan Inn High Street Stalham at 7pm. Carol singing was banned by Oliver Cromwell in 1647 along with Christmas celebrations, leading to pro-Christmas riots in many cities, including Norwich. In Victorian times carols were sung in pubs and it wasn't until the 1880's that they were first sung in churches. Last year the Swan was packed with local people enjoying traditional carols in a traditional setting. Pat was playing the electronic organ and Simone played the violin or fiddle which would have been the instrument used in Victorian times.
